Here are snapshots of just a few US-based companies doing just that.

Salvinos JR Models



im and Rick Salvino started business in 1989 as Salvinos Sports Legends with 9-inch resin figures with an autographed

card of the athlete. Jim sculpted the prototypes. The idea of kit production didn't come up until 2016. In 2018, Salvinos JR Models opened for business and is currently releasing four new kits a month in runs of 1,500 units. Aztec Dummy

Aztek Dummy makes airbrush masking sets for various science fiction subjects. Some highly complex color schemes are now within reach for your customers!



Company owner Lou Dalmaso retired from his graphic artist job in the Marketing Division of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture to start Aztek Dummy Productions in 2004. That prompted Lou to release the first template set, which followed the Polar Lights 1/1000 Enterprise NX-01 release. The templates make that multi-color Aztek paneling much easier to reproduce. The Aztek Dummy line expanded as more models from movie and TV sci-fi programming came to market. The latest releases are for AMT's All Aztek Dummy masking sets are designed, produced and packaged by Lou in his Raleigh, N.C. shop.

Mission Models

Mission Models started in Burbank, Calif., in 2002 selling rare resin kits. Mission then began importing and exporting



hobby tools to fill voids they saw in the hobby marketplace. Development of a paint line was already taking place. The right formula eluded them until they developed a fine-grade, water-borne, non-toxic art paint system designed for modelers. Mission Models Paints launched in 2018.

The Mission Models Paint line has been well received in the US and internationally. All products, including display racks and display materials, are made in the US. up, strengthening connections with suppliers and bringing distributors on board to get the products into hobby shops. Wally Findyzs stepped in as the third owner in 2021. Supplying products to retail shops is still the focus. Ted, Wally's son, has helped develop the company's YouTube channel, K&S Creators Collective. The videos show projects completed by makers of all kinds. Check with Stevens International, Heartland Hobby and other distributors for pricing and availability.

I got to speak to Ted Findyzs, the next in line to run the company now in the third generation of family ownership. K&S Precision Metals was founded in 1946


